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Finding your way around the project pack

This project pack is a cross-curricular collection of creative teaching ideas and resources around the theme of *Christmas* and is most suitable for KS1 children. Our aim is to bring together different resources from Teachit Primary into a cohesive collection, giving more support and structure than we can offer with stand-alone resources. The pack contains teaching activities linked to RE, Literacy and Design and technology. Where appropriate, each subject has links to the new 2014 curriculum and 'A quide to curriculum framework for Religious Education 2013'.

The pack lends itself to being used in different ways. It could form the basis of a whole week's project, or you could dip in and out of it over the course of a term.

The project is broken down into individual subject areas. Each section of the pack includes a set of teaching ideas, followed by accompanying resources. Wherever a teaching idea has a supporting resource we've indicated this and explained how the resource is relevant: for example, as a means to acquire background knowledge for the activity, to facilitate the recording or presentation of the activity or as an extension task related to the activity.

The resources are all available in adaptable formats, making it easy to differentiate the tasks by ability.

We've also included the file number for each original resource – just pop this into Teachit Primary's search engine to find the resource you are looking for. Most of the resources in this pack are Word documents, but we've also included links to PowerPoints and interactive activities. With Nativity plays, carol services and Christmas parties all occupying your valuable time, the season of goodwill can often leave you feeling pushed for time, so let us provide you with some ready to go resources to keep your spirits high. If you're looking for something with a little more substance than word searches and colouring sheets, dip into this project pack for some seasonal AND educational resources.

Who can resist the opportunity to read *The Jolly Christmas Postman*? So, deliver some fun activities playing around with characters and settings. It wouldn't be Christmas without a little sparkle, so try designing and making your very own crystal snowflakes — a great link to science too! Not forgetting, what, for many, is the most important aspect of Christmas, the Nativity story! Interview the people present or consider what gifts you would bring.

So there will be no 'Bah humbugs' just plenty of seasonal cheer!

Kick things off with an event!

No time for a big bash? Take an hour out to watch a festive movie — *Polar Express* and *The Snowman* are a couple of well-loved favourites. Then get the children to make trailers or posters to promote them. I-movies are great for this — really quick and easy to use.

Web links

It's always hard to keep things going right up till Christmas, with tired and excited children creating quite a challenge. Here are a few of the many festively themed interactive games to help keep your class on track.

The <u>Hwb Wales</u> has some simple sequencing and comparisons activities linked to the Nativity – easy to use, so perfect for early learners.

Mahjong is a Chinese matching game similar to solitaire, which <u>Kidsheart</u> have created into a Christmassy themed game. Some tiles contain seasonal facts too! Warning – this game is addictive – but great for thinking skills.

An old favourite is, of course, <u>Northpole.com</u>, which is jam-packed with activities such as the Elf Pal Academy but watch out for Americanisms.

Teachers' notes:

The key to this activity is to find a way of attaching recycled materials to the wreath. There are several different ways of doing this:

For materials that have a flat area, try cutting a
wreath shape from thick cardboard and simply
stick materials onto it. A hot glue gun might
work better than PVA or glue-sticks but this will
require a greater degree of adult supervision.





• For thin materials like plastic bags or paper shapes, try poking a length of modelling wire, or even a metal coat-hanger through each piece and then folding the wire to create a circular shape.
